

WALKING DOWN THE PATH

In his book, "In His Light", the Rev. William Anderson opens with a delightful story about a farm boy who had a fear of the dark. One night the boy's father told him to go to the barn and feed the horses. The boy turned pale. With this, his father stepped onto the porch, lit a lantern, and held it up.

"Son," he said, "how far can you see?" "I can see halfway to the barn," the boy said. The father gave his son the lantern and said, "Walk halfway to the barn." When the boy reached the halfway point, the father called out, "How far can you see now?" The boy said, "I can see the barn." "Good," said the father, "walk to the barn door." When the boy called back that he had reached the barn door, the father said, "Open it and tell me what you can see." The boy open the door and shouted back, "I can see the horses!" "Good," said the father, "now feed them."

That story makes an excellent point. The lantern didn't light up the whole barnyard. It lit up only a part of the path leading to the barn. But that was enough to get the boy started down the path. And as the boy walked down the path, he found the rest of the way himself.

Like the boy, we all need to get started down the path... the path of accepting the challenge of becoming partners in God's work on earth. To do this we need two things: the light of Christ and the courage to follow where this light leads. If we have this light and this courage we will be able to overcome our fears and fulfill our service to the Lord. What is our path? Where is the Lord trying to lead us?

The Dormition of our Most Holy Lady the Theotokos and Ever-Virgin Mary

Concerning the Dormition of the Theotokos, this is what the Church has received from ancient times from the tradition of the Fathers. When the time drew nigh that our Savior was wellpleased to take His Mother to Himself, He declared unto her through an Angel that three days hence. He would translate her from this temporal life to eternity and bliss. On hearing this, she went up with haste to the Mount of Olives, where she prayed continuously. Giving thanks to God, she returned to her house and prepared whatever was necessary for her burial. While these things were taking place, clouds caught up the Apostles from the ends of the earth, where each one happened to be preaching, and brought them at once to the

house of the Mother of God, who informed them of the cause of their sudden gathering. As a mother, she consoled them in their affliction as was meet, and then raised her hands to Heaven and prayed for the peace of the world. She blessed the Apostles, and, reclining upon her bed with seemliness, gave up her all-holy spirit into the hands of her Son and God.

With reverence and many lights, and chanting burial hymns, the Apostles took up that God-receiving body and brought it to the sepulcher, while the Angels from Heaven chanted with them, and sent forth her who is higher than the Cherubim. But one Jew, moved by malice, audaciously stretched forth his hand upon the bed and immediately received from divine judgment the wages of his audacity. Those daring hands were severed by an invisible blow. But when he repented and asked forgiveness, his hands were restored. When they had reached the place called Gethsemane, they buried there with honor the all-immaculate body of the Theotokos, which was the source of Life. But on the third day after the burial, when they were eating together, and raised up the artos (bread) in Jesus' Name, as was their custom, the Theotokos appeared in the air, saying "Rejoice" to them. From this they learned concerning the bodily translation of the Theotokos into the Heavens.
