

Church Year begins on September 1st

Since pagan times, the civil year has begun on January 1st, the month named for the pagan god Janus. The First Ecumenical Council that took place in Nicaea in the year 325 decreed that the Church year should begin on September 1st. The month of September was, for the Hebrews, the beginning of the civil year (Exodus 23:16), the month of gathering the harvest and of the offering of thanks to God. It was on this feast that the Lord Jesus entered the synagogue in Nazareth (Luke 4:16-21), opened the book of the Prophet Isaiah and read the words: The Spirit of the Lord God is upon Me; because the Lord hath anointed Me to preach good tidings unto the meek; He hath sent Me to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to them that are bound; to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all that mourn (Isaiah 61:1-2).

The month of September is also important in the history of Christianity, because Emperor Constantine the Great was victorious over Maxentius, the enemy of the Christian Faith, in September. Following this victory, Constantine granted freedom of confession to the Christian Faith throughout the Roman Empire. For a long time, the civil year in the Christian world followed the Church year, with its beginning on the first day of September. In the early days of the Church and the Christian Roman Empire, major decisions and policies were announced on this day. The New Year in the Latin Church is always on the first Sunday of Advent (the Philip's - Christmas Fast). As we begin this new Church year we pray: Creator of the universe, setting times and seasons by Your sole authority, bless the cycle of the year of Your grace, O Lord, guarding our rulers and Your nation in peace, at the intercession of the Theotokos, and save us.

Twelfth Sunday after Pentecost



Jesus never praised riches. Today he tells the people who have just seen a rich young man refuse the Lord's invitation to follow him, "it will be hard for one who is rich to enter the kingdom of heaven." This is repeated often in the scriptures. Jesus teaches, "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven (Matthew 5:3)" But the rich in spirit cannot love God more than themselves, and it is a simple reality that if they cannot love God, they cannot love their neighbors, created by God. Mary therefore declares, "The hungry he has filled with good things, and the rich he has sent away empty. (Luke 1:53) And

Abraham tells the rich man in hell, "you received what was good during your lifetime while Lazarus received what was bad; but now he is comforted here, whereas you are tormented. (Luke 16:25) And James admonishes his flock, who honored a rich man, "Are not the rich oppressing you? And do they themselves not haul you off to court? Is it not they who blaspheme the noble name that was invoked over you? (James 2:6-7)"

To be able to turn one's back on riches is what it means to be human. In transcending the world, we should be able to see infinite and eternal realities. There is nothing wrong or bad about the material creation God has given us, but it has the power to blind us to greater riches. God does not simply take away riches, but he gives us spiritual riches beyond our understanding. Today, the poorest among us have more than the richest people at the time of Jesus. This is why it is so much more important to be able to see spiritual realities.

The rich young man was unable to follow Jesus' call - today's Gospel describes the difficulty for a rich man to be saved: it is easier for a camel to go through a needle's eye; Jesus then emphasizes to the astonished disciples when asked "Who then can be saved?", that "with man this is impossible, but with God all things are possible."
